Statement of Intent

The intent of Collective Worship across our HSLT schools/academies, is to support pupils to *flourish and to thrive* and experience life in all its fullness (John 10:10).

The daily act of collective worship is central to our Trust and school/academy's theologically rooted in Christian vision and values, and makes an important contribution to the overall spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of the whole school community. It is the unique heartbeat of the school and is offered as part of a wider opportunity for pupils and adults to encounter faith by engaging in conversations about God, both as individuals and together. We want pupils to leave school with a rich experience and understanding of Christianity and we are committed to offering them an encounter with Jesus Christ and with Christian faith and practice, in a way that enhances their lives.

We have Trust Chaplaincy to support Collective Worship, offer prayer and spiritual guidance and further develop our links between schools and church and between the school and the wider community, including other denominations and faith communities.

1. Legal Framework

- **1.1.** This policy has due regard to all relevant **legislation** and **guidance** including, but not limited to, the following:
 - SIAMS Framework Church of England, September 2023
 - Diocese of York Collective Worship guidance, Worship Works, September 2022
 - The School Standards and Framework Act 1998 (Section 70*)

*This framework requires the Headteacher/Principal and Governing Body of every school/academy to provide a daily act of Collective Worship which is in line with the schools Trust Deed and foundation

• Right of Withdrawal

Parents/carers have the right to withdraw their child(ren) from acts of worship and this right is clearly stated on the school/academy website

- **1.2.** This policy operates in conjunction with the following **Trust** policies:
 - Equality Policy and Objectives
 - Social Emotional and Mental Health Policy

2. Content and Structure of Collective Worship

- 2.1. Our worship is inclusive, inspirational and invitational. It reflects the variety of Anglican and Methodist traditions found in the Church of England and will recognise and follow the Christian liturgical year, with varied liturgical and other traditions of Anglican worship and festivals in the UK and worldwide and, where appropriate, the Eucharist. To appreciate the relevance of faith in today's world, by encountering the teachings of Jesus and the Bible and developing understanding of the Christian belief in the Trinitarian nature of God. It includes opportunities for prayer, reading and reflecting on the Bible, liturgy, sacrament and experience of the musical and other imaginative riches of Christianity.
- 2.2. Collective worship will help pupils and adults to reflect on our Trust and school theologically underpinned Christian vision and values.
- 2.3. It will offer the opportunity, without compulsion, to all pupils and adults to **grow spiritually** through experiences of prayer, stillness, worship and reflection.
- **2.4.** It will also be an opportunity to **celebrate and give thanks** for achievements within the school, local and international community and occasions of significance, including festivals.
- 2.5. Our worship is planned and delivered by a number of different people including, staff, Trust chaplains and our pupil Collective Worship group and consists of 4 stages:
 - Gather we welcome the school community with music, liturgy and the lighting of a candle
 - Engage we share, for example a Bible reading, followed by an activity to engage pupils with the Christian message
 - Respond pupils have the opportunity for reflection through discussion, sharing thoughts, pray if they wish, sing
 - Send we share the message of the worship again and ask the school community to reflect upon the message in their daily lives. We close with liturgy, final prayer, music and the blowing out of our special candle

3. Monitoring and Evaluation of Collective Worship

- **3.1.** A **school worship-planning and evaluation group** meets each half-term led by the Collective Worship lead. This group includes the Collective Worship lead, link foundation governor and where relevant the chaplain. These meetings are an opportunity to review and evaluate Collective Worship, regarding its impact on the school and wider community and to plan themes for the next term. Regular evaluation each half-term of Collective Worship is undertaken by the group, through pupil voice, observation of worship and staff and wider community voice.
- **3.2. A pupil worship group** meets each half-term to feed into this group, through planning of worship and pupil evaluation.
- **3.3. The Trust Director of Ethos and Church Schools** monitors Collective Worship each half-term, through school link visits and reports to the Trust Distinctiveness Committee
- 3.4. Collective Worship is monitored by the Trustees and school governors as a standing item on the **Trust**Board Distinctiveness Committee and Local Governing Committee meetings
- **3.5.** Worship is **independently inspected by law under Section 48 of the Education Act 2005** in consultation with the Diocese of York(SIAMS).

4. CPD and Training Opportunities for Collective Worship

- **4.1.** Regular CPD and training opportunities are delivered through the Diocese of York and are bespoke to school needs.
- **4.2.** The Trust Church School group meets each half-term for schools to further refine and evaluate Collective Worship.
